Mr. Firestine announced to the Board that Chandra McPherson is a representative on the Prince George Promise Committee, which is a partner of the America's Promise-The Alliance for Youth foundation founded by Colin Powell.



Beacon may never make money

But the theater could become self-sustaining

HOPEWELL — The Beacon Theatre might never generate revenue for the city, said Scott Firestine, director of the Appomattox Regional Library System, who is in charge of the committee overseeing the venue's restoration

But Firestine said yesterday that he expects the theater to become self-sustaining in the near future.

"Since May, the Beacon has generated \$3,000 from

"Since May, the Beacon has generated \$3,000 from renting it out [for private functions]," he said. The cost for the city was \$23,000 during that time, but Firestine said most of that was one-time expenses.

"We had to pay for some necessary repairs and we had to purchase new chairs and tables, totaling \$14,000," Firestine said. "We don't expect to see these expenses next year."

The city officially took ownership of the Beacon on.

The city officially took ownership of the Beacon on April 19— three weeks to the day after a Circuit Court ruling fliat the former owner Hopewell Preservation Inc. was to turn over the deed after violating a 13-year-old funding agreement. Shortly after, City Council put the restoration effort under the responsibility of the library system.

Firestine's vision is to fully restore the theater for public use by 2016, which marks Hopewell's 100th anniversary. Two weeks ago today, City Council gave Firestine full support to apply for a \$600,000 grant

from the Virginia Department of Housing and Community Development to aid Phase 2 of the renovation efforts.

"The funding comes from the 2012 Industrial Revitalization Fund Grant," Firestine said. "The total grant is \$3 million and was put forward to help localities in distress."

Only larger, non-residential projects qualify for the one-time grant.

"The Beacon fits the measure for that pretty well," Firestine said. He added that if the application is approved, the money will go toward the expected \$5 million budget for the renovation.

The city's ownership of the Beacon remains controversial among many citizens who believe that the city should not spend more money on what they consider a dying downtown area

But Firestine continues to stand by the Beacon ren-

ovation.

"The theater used to be an entertainment cornerstone for the city," he said. "And it still is a gateway for what once was a vibrant downtown."

This week, the city will also begin the search for contractors willing to enter a public-private-partnership with the city over the Beacon Theatre.

City Manager Ed Daley said that one contractor had already made an offer

"Law requires that we advertise and give other possible contractors the chance to submit a proposal," he said.

After the procurement phase, all offers will go before City Council for further evaluation before a decision will be made.

But Firestine said yesterday that a public-privatepartnership agreement is not written in stone.

"I told City Council if someone offers \$5 million to buy the Beacon, they should go for it," he said.




